

### Gravesite

#### Urn Garden

## Columbarium



A columbarium is a structure designed for storing cremated remains in individual compartments called niches. Columbaria offer a costeffective, space-efficient, and low-maintenance option for memorializing loved ones who have been cremated.

- **Niches:** These are the individual compartments within the columbarium designed to hold urns. They come in various sizes to accommodate different urn dimensions and can often hold multiple urns for couples or families.
- **Memorialization:** Columbarium niches usually have a front panel that can be engraved with the deceased's name, dates of birth and death, and other personal information or messages. Some may also allow for the placement of small photos or mementos.
- **Structure:** Columbaria can take various forms, including freestanding structures, walls, or even rooms within a larger building such as a mausoleum. They can be located indoors or outdoors and are often designed to blend harmoniously with the surrounding environment.

# **Family Plots / Mausoleums**

**Family Plots** are designated areas within a cemetery where multiple members of the same family can be buried together. It provides a sense of continuity and connection, allowing families to create a lasting legacy and shared resting place for generations to come. Family plots often feature a central monument or headstone with the family name, along with individual markers for each person interred within the plot. They offer a sense of belonging and tradition, allowing families to visit and honor their ancestors in a unified and meaningful way.

Mausoleums are large, above-ground structure designed for the entombment of deceased individuals in crypts or vaults, often featuring ornate architecture and serving as a grand and permanent memorial. Individuals or families typically choose mausoleums as their final resting place. The decision might be made during pre-planning or by surviving family members after a death. Factors influencing the choice include personal preference, religious or cultural beliefs, budget, and a desire for above-ground entombment.
